PRESENTATIONS

CYMHSU COMMUNITY OF PRACTICE Drs Matthew Chow, Shirley Sze, Matthew Burkey

- An update was presented on the strategic plan for the Child and Youth Mental Health and Substance Use (CYMHSU) Physicians' Community of Practice (CoP).
- A CYMHSU CoP Gathering in October 2018 brought together 60+ participants from various disciplines

- across the province to endorse the strategic plan. See summary report and plan here.
- The main areas of focus of the plan includes: 1) guiding health system decision-making towards equitable access to integrated CYMH care;
- 2) advancing a new standard of care by enrolling communities in trauma-informed care; and 3) strengthening the community of practice.
- The CYMHSU CoP structure consists of three working groups: Government Relations, Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs), and Networks.
- The CoP members communicate through Slack, as a forum for discussion and information-sharing.
- The CoP is organizing the next ACEs Summit, which will be held on May 9, 2019 at the Sheraton Vancouver Airport Hotel. More information is available on the ACEs Summit here.

KOOTENAY BOUNDARY PALLIATIVE CARE Dr Lilli Kerby and Rachel Schmidt

- The success of this project was due to the following; an equal partnership with Interior Health; a teambased care approach; representation of the community voice; shared decision-making at all levels; and application of learnings from other Shared Care sites.
- The project goals were to: 1) build a culture of teambased community palliative care; 2) support the work of community hospice organizations and shift the way the healthcare system orients itself around medical aspects of palliative care; and 3) introduce and deliver a palliative approach component to Chronic Disease management.
- Multi-disciplinary teams were developed around patients to share information, and provide a timely response to patient needs.
- LEAP has been used as a tool and educational platform in Kootenay Boundary, and 125 health providers have been involved since 2016.
- This project is now investigating regional spread and mentorship and will be holding a Palliative Round Table in April 2019.
- Other activities include, exploring further work in chronic disease and oncology, rural solutions and technologies, and provider wellness, as well as connecting with the Provincial Network.
