PARTNERING WITH SHARED CARE

Each month the Shared Care Committee (SCC) reviews Expressions of Interest (EOIs) and Proposals submitted from communities/Divisions of Family Practice interested in engaging in Shared Care work. The following are details of approved 'new and ongoing' partnerships from the meeting.

SCC Response to COVID-19, Margaret English

- Shared Care wishes to provide support and funding to communities so that GPs and Specialists can continue to focus on patient care.
- As per SCC guidelines, funds can be used for planning, meetings between physicians, project staff time, and developing new/temporary processes with GPs and Specialists.
- Funds may not be used for clinic fees, MOA wages, PPE, technology platforms, rentals, capital costs, or leased space.
- The proposed funding approval process includes: SC Liaisons gather information from the communities and create one page funding request for approval up to \$20,000 per community for review of SCC Co-Chairs.
- Funding requests greater than \$20,000 will be brought forward for approval of the SCC.

- System responsibility for remuneration to physicians for additional work in relation to COVID-19 planning is currently under discussion.
- The issue of physician accommodation during COVID-19 will be raised at an upcoming JCC Co-Chair meeting.
- It was noted that the quick response to COVID-19 across all of the JCCs has been appreciated.

Provincial Best-Practices in Oral Opioid Agonist Therapy (BOOST) Collaborative – Dr Cole Stanley, Ray Grewal

- The BOOST Collaborative was launched in January 2019
 to provide equitable access to integrated, evidencebased care to support clients with Opioid Use Disorder
 (OUD). SCC funds supported the engagement of private
 practice physicians.
- The SCC approved the BOOST Collaborative to use unspent funds to engage the same private practice physicians, and any new interested teams, to support the expansion of the BOOST Collaborative into a Quality Improvement Network.
- The funds would also be used to maintain a community of practice among providers caring for OUD clients, and to sustain improvements.
- It was noted that the Collaborative provides regular updates to the AMHSU Network Advisory Committee through which connections have been established between the Collaborative and the BC Centre of Substance Use.
- Discussions around integrating the work will continue at the AMHSU Network Advisory Committee workshop in June 2020.

CBT Provincial Spread: Draft Implementation Plan

- In February 2020, following a formal assessment, the SCC decided to proceed with a development of a draft implementation plan for cross-provincial spread of the Cognitive Behavioural Therapy Skills.
- Robyn Kuropatwa from RKL Consultants, presented the CBT Draft Implementation plan to the committee, outlining an 18-month implementation timeline with the four core steps: i) Prepare ii) Communicate, iii)

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Engage and Educate GPs and other Stakeholders iv) Implement, Measure and Adjust

- It was agreed that there are many pieces of the preplanning that could be started now without overwhelming external individuals who are currently focused on COVID-19.
- **SCC agreed to proceed** with proposed internal activities of the six-month preplanning stage.
