The following are details of approved funding for 'new and ongoing' projects from the meeting.

Proposals Summary Report

Laura Anderson presented a summary of project work happening and highlighted trends and opportunities for improvement.

The committee inquired if SCC has influence over the work being chosen. It was clarified that Shared Care does **not** put forward calls for proposals targeting specific patient populations.

The table also inquired what happens to stalled projects. The existing process includes a follow-up and a limit placed on extensions. A firm policy to recover funding for stalled projects has not yet been established.

SCC Strategic Plan – 2022/23 Work Plan

Adrian Leung and Laura Anderson presented the framework for the SCC strategic plan, providing an overview of SCC's mandate in engaging physicians and health care leaders to realize sustainable improvements on a local level, as well as at a wider system level.

The committee noted that the work plan is influenced by governing bodies and the PMA negotiation results.

Further feedback from the committee included:

- A concern regarding the reduced allocation of funds to the older adults initiative, which is a growing issue.
- Concerns about IHI applications being declined and receiving feedback on budget limits. A comment was made that if the

budget can support the increased scholarship demand, it should be adjusted/reviewed.

- The table discussed reallocation opportunities and noted further offline discussions are required.
- Improved alignment is needed between the JCC Cultural Safety & Humility work with the health authorities.

The committee then separated into smaller breakout rooms to discuss the innovation portfolio, requirements to maximize the increasing impact portfolio, and shifting focus to meet the direction of the PSC.

Adrian Leung, Laura Anderson, and SCC staff will review breakout room discussions and committee feedback with the co-chairs, with an aim to develop workplan recommendations for the October 18 SCC meeting.
