

2018 Physician & Project Leads Workshop SUMMARY

OVERVIEW

On May 8 and 9, 2018, the Shared Care Committee (SCC) held its **6th annual Physician and Project Leads Workshop** at the Hotel Grand Pacific in Victoria, BC.


The overall theme of this year's workshop was **'Building Momentum'**, focusing particularly on the future of Shared Care with regards to sustainability and spread, enhancing evaluations, and sharing learnings and successes among current projects.




PARTICIPANT BREAKDOWN: WHO ATTENDED

This year, we welcomed **79 attendees** to the Workshop, including **14 Physician Leads**, **32 Project Leads**, and **3 evaluators**, and a variety of other roles. This workshop saw the **largest number of attendees** to date.

EVALUATING OUR SUCCESS: YOUR FEEDBACK

We were disappointed that **only 36% of attendees** completed the Workshop Evaluation Form. However, the feedback provided a good overview of the successes, challenges, and suggested areas for improvement.

Successes

The sessions you felt were the most relevant and clearly delivered were the **Project Lead Rapid Fires, Physician and Project Leads Table Dialogue**, closely followed by **Shared Care Evaluations, Hot Topics** and **Accelerating Spread and Sustainability**.

This was echoed in your comments about the ‘most valuable session of the day,’ with many of you stating how you appreciated the opportunity to ask questions and learn more from others face-to-face:

“I really appreciated the keynote speakers – powerful stories.”

“The evaluation content was valuable. An area that doesn’t get as much attention as it should.”

“Physician Leads Table Dialogue – Opportunities to share concerns/priorities face to face.”

“Hot Topics – great to hear targeted questions. Great conversation.”

“Project Rapid Fires – gave me a good sense of what SC is doing. Helps spread and sustainability.”



Challenges

On a less than positive note, some mentioned the difficulty hearing the presenters, reading the text on the slides, and seeing past the big pillar in the middle of the room.

Areas for Improvement

All of your feedback will be considered when planning starts for next year's workshop. In the meantime, here is a compilation of some of your suggestions for improvement:

"More rapid fires! More time to talk to other project leads who are working on similar projects. Provide list of leads and focus of their work."


"Showcase successful initiatives from a variety of Divisions, including examples of spread and evaluation successes."


"Place Shared Care Co-Chairs and Leads at different tables throughout the room for better knowledge exchange."
